to master. They are generally defined in a few key points which can be found in the dozens of books available, Lombardi and Maxwell being 2 that come to mind. Execution is the difficult part as each has their own individual style requiring a constant adjustment to be effective. The Grand Lodge of Arizona hosts a Leadership Conference every March to assist in development our next Masonic leaders. It is a great forum to better understand the non-ritualistic aspects of our fraternity and

meet your Arizona Grand Lodge officers and Brethren.

The general path of a Lodge officer starts with the Stewards, progressing to the Deacons and then to the pedestal officers. This path allows for not only demonstrating the ritual proficiency of the current office but learning those of the next in the progression; "walk before your run", "drink from the straw instead of the fire hose". It also integrates each officer into the overall responsibilities in the operation of the Lodge as they progress to the East. Whether your goal is to pursue a path to the East or become more involved in the Lodge, ritualistic or non-ritualistic, the key is to let your intentions be known and start developing your Masonic skills now. The Lodge officers are there to assist you in that endeavor based on their own individual experiences. The key to building any structure capable of withstanding the rigors of the seasons is to start with a solid foundation.
